3rd Annual Conference Details (continued from p 1)

We are the booking agent. That means you make your reservations with us, pay us, and we pay them. We have to have a firm commitment on a final minimum of rooms by mid-May, so we have asked for a May 1 deadline. After May 1, it may still be possible to attend the Conference, but we cannot guarantee the availability of rooms at the resort. They indicate their demand should not be too great so availability should be ok, but for our own peace of mind, we would appreciate your commitment now. The rates include three meals a day and two nutrition breaks breaks. There is a shop for additional snacks, etc. Recreational activities include sailing, fishing, tennis, jogging, water-skiing, hiking, biking. Some of us are bringing our own canoes, bikes, and sailboats. Check in is 4pm, check-out noon.

The room rates per person at double occupancy (there are a double and single bed in all rooms) are Can\$84.18 per night. At current exchange rates of .81 x Can\$ = US\$, that becomes US\$68.19. Or for the three nights, Can\$253/US\$205. For single occupancy, add almost 50%. For children, add \$0 age 0-3, Can\$37.21 (US\$30.14) for age 4-7, \$49.41/40.02 for ages 8-12, \$60.39/48.92 for ages 13-17, per night. For those not lodging at the resort, there is a Can\$8 per day plus meals charge. Please send to Fred at our Vermont headquarters your checks, \$50 for the conference fee if you haven't yet paid that, and 40% of your estimated food/lodging bill. Add the US\$25 membership fee to the Society if you are not yet a paid member of the Society. Phone Fred immediately since it is getting late already.

Transportation: Limousine service for the 90 mile, hour and a half airport/Geneva Park trip is very reasonable. The rates (one-way) depend on the number traveling together in the Van. They vary from Can\$ 15-44 (US\$ 12-35), for 9-1 passengers, e.g., four passengers, a likely scenario, would be approx. Can\$20, US\$16 per person). Call 705 835-3650 (or for those in Ontario but not at an 835 exchange, you can use 800 461-7529). Ask for Linda. Their name is Simcoe County Airport Services. (137 Brock St., Barrie, Ont L4N 2M3, Canada .) Tell them you are with our Society.

Here are some APA advisories on border crossing in and out of Canada: For US citizens and residents, carry passport, birth certificate, or voters registration card or a 1551 or 1151 (Green Card). Other nationalities must have a valid passport and/or visitors visa from their local Canadian Embassy/Consulate or High Commission Office. Computers, recent cameras, videos, recorders, etc, register with U.S. or your country's Customs or have invoices (I usually make a list to facilitate their registration).

Hector Sabelli's group which includes Linnea Carlson-Sabelli and Minu Patel, and organizational psychology by Stephen Guastello, one of the first to do catastrophe research in psychology. In addition to this day long session, there is a debate in the APS program entitled: Chaos Theory: Secret Sect for Mathematical Mystics versus Popular Multidisciplinary Metamodeling Paradigm, with George Mpitsos on modeling brain/behavior dynamics, Peter Killeen on The Mechanics of Behavior, and Gary Burlingame on Deterministic Chaos in Quality of Verbal Interactions in Group Psychotherapy, all taking the winning side of the debate, and moderator Fred Abraham taking the losing side, whichever that might be.

The January *Monitor*, newsletter of the American Psychological Association (APA) carried a front page article on chaos, and there have been some letters in the subsequent issues. You are all encouraged write follow-up letters to keep the issues forefront, and to help sophisticate the discussion. The article was the result of a series of interviews with Larry Vandervert, Michael Bütz, Bill McCown, and Linda Chamerlain. It has generated much enthusiasm in APA and netted our Society many new members. We owe them a debt of gratitude.

As last year, there are several chaos events at the APA convention in Toronto which is sequent to ours in August. I got notices giving me participation times for events I had forgotten I was participating in. Sally Goerner has organized a Preconference Workshop, called Chaos: Methods and Theory for Psychologists, which actually commences the morning of our last conference day (we run till noon that day). Those participating include Allan Combs, Tom Gentry, Reidborg, Redington, Hector Sabelli, and when he gets there in the afternoon after our conference, Fred. Sally also has a Div 24 symposium on the APA program entitled Chaos theory across the spectrum of psychology's discourses, involving some of the same folk I think. Bill McCown, Michael Bütz, and Linda Chamberlain are again doing a Div. 43 panel on family therapy. Larry Vandervert is giving a Div 24 invited address on Neurological Positivism. If there are others, please bring them to our attention.

Irma Alm, from her interests in avoidance of air traffic and other technological/human/control accidents, writes, from Sweden (via our e-mail Chaopsyc service):

"This question as brought me to a more or less philosophical journey concerning our views on humans, the organization of cognition, and human learning ability. It seems that there exist two pathways along which we may increase our understanding of the human cognition. The fixed path and the learning path. These two cannot be studied separately, because the fixed path determines to a large degree the learning path. To understand how the human cognition is organized, I've been referring to Maturana (1980) and to Vandervert (1992). I'm discussing the implications of these thereoetical viewpoints on learning and interaction. These implications are suggesting

that human errors emerging from the interaction between humans and technology are nonavoidable. Such errors seem to be the prerequisites for both cognitive development and technological progress." I would respond that I too have long maintained that such dynamical behavior which is often considered bad by society, specifically, hyperactivity in children, also be considered as part of a useful (beneficial) dynamical process. The focus for a cure on HIV high evolution rates shows viral benign/fatal considerations are parts of a normal dynamical process. It also is at the center of Frank Mosca's chaos views of good vs evil and happiness; many mystical traditions often deny these distinctions, or revel in their paradox. Goertzel's and Goerner's books (see article on references) also discuss natural evolution and its relationship to psychology, and I have an unpublished ms that is a sequel to Vandervert's Neurological Positivism.
